Summary: From scandalous (and sexist) comments about women's bodies (e.g., Rush Limbaugh's attack on Sandra Fluke, Todd Akin's comment of "legitimate rape") to the rise in the debate about women's reproductive rights, much attention has been given to women voters in the 2012 elections. This panel of feminist rhetorical scholars examines the role of women and gender in political discourse.
