ICD-10 Coding for Home Health Agencies

The series will present a session approximately once a month to enable participants to become familiar with the ICD-10 changes in an incremental fashion by focusing on 1-2 specific chapters in each session to learn the organization of the ICD-10 chapter(s), unique features of ICD-10 utilized in that chapter, chapter specific guidelines, major changes from ICD-9 coding seen in that topical area, and highlight diagnoses more likely to be used in home health. These webinars will benefit those individuals new to coding as well as seasoned coders.
