SUBJECT: Legislative Update

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## *On the Hill*

### *Fiscal Year 2013 Budget:*

Bigger picture developments in the FY2013 budget process include:

- Senate Budget Committee Chairman Kent Conrad (D-ND) offered a version of a debt reduction plan initially proposed by the National Commission on Fiscal Responsibility and Reform, which was formed in 2010. This plan, known as the “Simpson-Bowles” plan after the chairs of the Commission, proposed a range of cuts and tax increases, including \$200 billion in cuts in discretionary spending, mainly focused on discretionary defense programs. It is suggested that Senator Conrad’s motivations were to confront Republican accusations that the Senate was not moving on a budget resolution. The move was largely symbolic as no amendments were allowed and no votes are expected on the bill. Nevertheless it gives an indication of the tenor of the budget debate in Washington, D.C.
- The Senate Appropriations Committee held a hearing on Thursday April 19th that set a specific funding level of \$157.7 billion for the Labor, Health and Human Services and Education appropriation bill (“Labor HHS”). This is known as a “302(b) allocation” and represents an increase of \$1.5 billion over the current level. The Senate Labor-HHS appropriations subcommittee must develop a bill that adheres to the \$157.7 billion level.
- Meanwhile, during the week of April 16<sup>th</sup>, the House of Representatives approved an overall level of federal discretionary spending for FY2013 of \$1.028 trillion. Since the House discretionary spending cap is \$19 billion below the Senate, the House 302(b) allocations, to be established in the near future, will likely be lower.

### **Important Legislation:**

#### *H.R.4227 Workforce Investment Act of 2012 (Minority Proposal)*

On March 20, Rep. John Tierney (D-MA) introduced H.R. 4227, Workforce Investment Act of 2012. The bill proposes to reauthorize the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 and would streamline and improve the workforce investment system, improve system accountability, and promote innovation and best practices within the workforce investment system. H.R. 4227 has been referred to the House Committee on Education and the Workforce, and has 2 cosponsors: Rep. George Miller (D-CA) [Ranking Member of Education and Workforce

Committee] and Rep Ruben Hinojosa (TX-15). NCDA leadership should consider meeting with either of these legislative offices to discuss provisions of the bill related to career development.

*H.R. 4297 Workforce Investment Improvement Act of 2012(Majority Proposal)*

On March 29, 2012, Rep. Virginia Foxx (R-NC) introduced H.R. 4297, the Workforce Investment Improvement Act of 2012. This bill is the Republican version of the WIA reauthorization and proposes to consolidate more than 20 programs into one flexible Workforce Investment Fund. H.R. 4297 has 2 cosponsors: Rep. Joe Heck (R-NV) and Rep. Howard P “Buck” McKeon (R-CA).

### House Education and Workforce Hearing on “Workforce Investment Act of 2012 (H.R. 4297)”

On April 17, 2012 the House Education and Workforce Committee held a hearing on the Workforce Investment Improvement Act of 2012. The panel included:

- [Ms. Sandy Harmsen](#), Director, Workforce Development for San Bernardino County

Committee Chairman Kline’s (R-MN) [opening statement](#) addressed the need to rein in a “bureaucracy that squanders taxpayer resources, stifles innovation, and stands in the way of the help and training workers need.” He cited numerous programs with different federal directives and concluded that most of the money spent on workforce training is wasted on red tape.

Ranking Member Miller’s (D-CA) [opening statement](#) spoke to the need to make smart investments in the workforce and to improve accountability in the workforce system. He outlined specific points he would like addressed during the WIA reauthorization including:

1. Establishing a system that also provides for the most disadvantaged
2. Increasing accountability
3. Supporting successful programs
4. Involving all stakeholders in the system
5. Encouraging a long term vision of skills attainment
6. Creating a system that gauges demand from industry

Rep. Miller does not believe H.R. 4297 addresses all of the above concerns.

The hearing played out according to the opening statements of the chairman and ranking member. There was a general consensus among the witnesses that there should be more local control over spending as well as an agreement on a need to consolidate many of the programs within the workforce system. Ms. Noble made the point that there is no “overall” vision for the programs which would be very helpful in cross program coordination. Mr. Van Kleneun also raised concerns that the consolidation of various programs would result in underserved groups being further ignored because they are often the most difficult to assist. Interestingly, witnesses were asked if there are ideas in the minority’s WIA proposal that should be considered in this bill. Of the witnesses, only Mr. Van Kleneun said yes.

*As Advocacy Associates monitors the WIA reauthorization, we will work to identify important policy issues to NCDA in order to send related letters of support or opposition to members on the committee. NCDA should also look to partner with other organizations, such as the National Skills Coalition, the American Counseling Association or ACTE in order to make the greatest impact as Congress moves forward.*

A point of particular interest to NCDA is how veterans receive individualized skills assessment and evaluation relative to the current job market.
