Dear Chairman Pryor and Ranking Member Blunt:

Thank you for your leadership in ensuring that funding food safety activities is one of Congress's highest priorities especially during this time of federal budget reductions. The below signed organizations are committed to making sure America's food supply is the safest in the world. We urge you to continue to appropriately fund the food safety activities of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) rather than support the imposition of any new food regulatory taxes on food makers and consumers.

As you know, the administration's recently proposed fiscal year (FY) 2014 budget for FDA includes a proposal to impose a food facility registration and inspection fee to fund agency activities "required by the *Food Safety Modernization Act* (FSMA)." The agency projects it will collect \$59 million in FY 2014 from food and feed producers, makers and distributors if this new fee is authorized by Congress. A food import fee is also proposed, with projected revenues of \$166 million in FY 2014.

FDA's budget proposals for FY 2012 and FY 2013 also recommended raising revenue from new facility registration fees to help fund the agency's food safety activities. Congress rejected those proposals. Congress also considered and rejected such food facility registration fees during its consideration of FSMA, which was signed into law on January 4, 2011.

If FDA requires additional funds to support FSMA implementation and food inspection activities, we believe the agency should request such funding through the appropriations process, rather than seeking authorization of new regulatory taxes, which Congress has repeatedly rejected.

Over the past five years, FDA has been one of the few federal agencies to receive discretionary funding increases through the annual appropriations process. In fact, Congress provided approximately \$12.8 million in the recently passed FY 2013 continuing resolution to support FDA's implementation of FSMA.

The food and beverage community has worked diligently over the past two years to assist the agency in modernizing the food inspection system and implement FSMA. We stand ready to work with Congress and the administration to help FDA prioritize and fund

its food safety and inspection activities. However, imposing new fees on food facilities would represent a food safety tax on consumers.

As food and beverage companies and consumers continue to cope with a period of prolonged economic turbulence, the creation of a new food tax would burden food makers with higher costs and consumers with higher food prices.

We urge Congress to provide FDA with sufficient funds to meet its food safety responsibilities without saddling food makers and consumers with new regulatory taxes.
