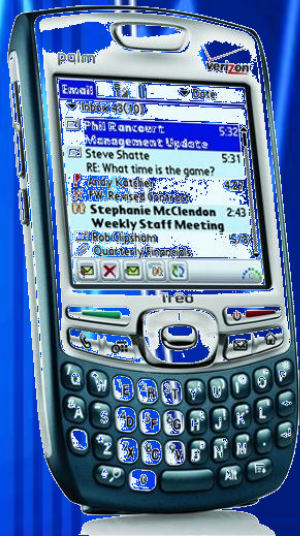

 - Mobile messaging
 - Camera / video phone
 - 20,000 + apps
 - Multiple models supported by all carriers
 - Many medical apps available
 - Good email device



Palm phone

- Palm PRE2
 - 330 min talk time
 - Mobile messaging
 - Camera phone
 - Few apps available
 - Good support for medical programs



Windows mobile phones

- HTC Trophy
 - 300 min. talk time
 - Mobile messaging
 - Camera/video phone
 - Voice control
 - Hundreds of Apps
 - Runs windows phone7
 - Most carriers support windows phones
 - Most popular paid medical programs supported



Android phones



- Motorola Droid Razr, Droid Bionic, Droid Pro, HTC Rezound, Thunderbolt, Rhyme, LG Spectrum, Enlighten, Vortex, Samsung Galaxy Nexus, Illusion, Stratosphere
 - 480/390/312/450/420 min. talk time
 - Mobile messaging

- 8GB \$229, 32GB \$299, 64GB \$399
 - Voice control with 32 and 64 GB models
 - Calendar
 - Email
 - Internet capable (WiFi device)
 - 4000+ medical apps
 - 400,000 + apps
 - Internet accessible only in WiFi zone

HP ipaq

- Uses WindowsMobile operating system
- Can run palm applications with Styletap
- Excellent screen
- Fast processor
- Expensive device
- No real apps available
- Paid medical applications available



Ipad2

- Runs most Ipod apps
- 60,000 native Ipad apps
- Camera/video
- Limited memory (max 64GB)
- Won't fit in a pocket
- May be used as a book reader
- Higher cost \$499 - \$699
- WiFi and 3G versions available



Android Tablets

- Samsung Galaxy Tab 10.1" screen \$499
 - 16GB, 3G device, dual cameras
 - 14 hour battery life
- Samsung Galaxy Tab 8.9" screen \$449
 - 16GB, 3G device, dual cameras
 - 13 hour battery life
- Samsung Galaxy Tab 7.0" screen \$399
 - 16GB, 3G device, dual cameras
 - 10 hour battery life

 - Android Honeycomb OS

- Limited RAM (1-2GB)
- Limited hard drive (160-320GB)
- May not run all computer programs
- Heavy compared to other devices
- Won't fit in a pocket

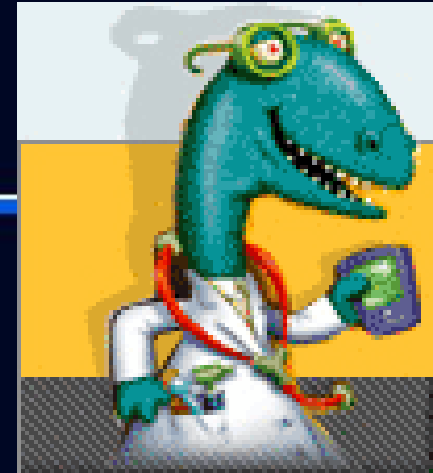

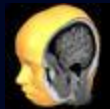
