



## **Communication Quarterly, 58.1 Published**

The March 2010 issue of *Communication Quarterly* is now available and features a range of articles authored by scholars from around the nation. Volume 58.1 includes:

The late **Michael Pfau** and his colleagues and students from the University of Oklahoma explore the relative impact of outcome-relevant, value-relevant, and impression-relevant involvement on resistance to influence and whether it is possible to enhance elicited threat levels and, if so, to what effect on resistance to counterattitudinal attacks.



**Jordan Soliz** (University of Nebraska) and his colleagues investigate perceptions of family communication among members with different sexual identities and specifically, from the perspective of heterosexual family members, use an intergroup perspective to determine how accommodative and nonaccommodative communication and attitudes toward homosexuality predict intergroup anxiety and relational satisfaction with gay or lesbian family members.

**Thomas Discenna** (Oakland University) offers a critical rhetoric analysis of the 1995 Yale Grade Strike where graduate student employees at the Ivy League school withheld grades in order to win recognition of their union. Discenna argues that the labor identity constructed at Yale is predicated on the historical-material circumstances of graduate labor in the modern corporate university.



**Sharon Mazzerella** (James Madison University) presents a qualitative and quantitative content analysis of U.S. newspaper coverage of early puberty in girls that concludes that newspapers have framed the phenomenon as one in which girls' bodies have transgressed culturally prescribed dictates of childhood innocence.
