Why is the legislature important?

- Discusses and votes on proposed laws
- Approves the state budget
- Establishes the courts
- Has some oversight over state agencies
- Can override the governor's veto with a two-thirds vote
- Perform services for their constituents and work with cities and towns within their districts



- Special event/rally



Advocacy Pro Tips

Do

- Remember legislators are just people
- Mention that you are a constituent
- Lead with your experience/expertise
- Be polite, friendly, and patient
- Be concise and to the point
- Make the issue personal (remember: stories are stickier than data)
- Be prepared to talk with staff who work with your elected official
- Thank them and follow-up

Don't

- Assume someone else is contacting your legislators about this issue
- Be intimidated
- Be dishonest or exaggerate
- Be afraid to say you don't know
- Forget your power



For effective, strategic advocacy...

Connect with organizations like MPHA on campaigns you care about! They analyze policy, build coalitions, and know when and how to take action to influence legislators.

What is lobbying?

Direct Lobbying

- Communication to an elected official or staffer +
- 2. Specific legislation +
- 3. An opinion on that legislation

Grassroots Lobbying

- 1. Communication to people +
- 2. Expressing a view on specific legislation +
- 3. A call to action





Advocacy or Lobbying?

- Sending a mass email to a listserv asking subscribers to contact their legislators about co-sponsoring a bill that protects low-income folks from evictions
- Organizing an educational public forum for local politicians to debate and share their views on transportation issues
- Speaking with a legislator about how the farmers market incentives program has impacted the community
- Calling or writing members of the legislature asking them to vote against the current version of a climate bill

When and how can you lobby?

- We all have a responsibility to lobby!
- Most of you will never hit the threshold that would jeopardize your non-profit's 501(c) 3 status or require you to register as lobbyist
- If your work is 100% state or federally funded, you can lobby on your own personal time
- If you work for government, you are legally able to lobby, but may want to check with your organization to understand your own organizational policies
