MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Good tidings in the new year! MIMDA held its first Town Hall at its January Board meeting. I appreciate our members who joined the call and would like your feedback on what you would like more or less of in this forum. We intend to have these 3-4 times a year. Please email me at huckinsc@gmail.com with your ideas.

Our delegates for the AMDA House of Delegates meeting were selected. Iris Boettcher MD, Cynthia Ochs DO, Mirza Beg MD, Nicholas Kielhorn MD, and Cheryl Huckins MD will represent the Michigan chapter. We will also introduce a resolution requesting AMDA's support to find best practices in real-time bidirectional communication between venues of care, i.e. emergency room/inpatient and skilled facilities.

Our brainstorming session focused on increasing the number of clinical providers in our workspace. As we all know, the U.S. population is aging, and our licensed workforce is decreasing. Who will take care of us and our generation? Concerns that were raised were 1) the poor reimbursement for our services, 2) lack of exposure for internal medicine residents to the skilled and assisted living setting during training, and 3) payment for mentoring. In addition to advocating for changes in these areas, we need to communicate to the clinician world the real benefits and satisfaction that this work offers.

Consider doing a Grand Rounds presentation at your local hospital about our role and what it's like: the reliance on clinical diagnostic skills, relationships with residents and families, collaboration with care teams, and schedule flexibility. Agree to have students shadow you and to mentor residents. Let your midcareer colleagues know that there is a second life in PALTC that is meaningful!

Finally, an update on **Moving Forward Michigan**. The Moving Forward Coalition, an outgrowth of the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine 2022 report on the status of nursing homes in the US, has its first working state committee right here in Michigan! It worked in 2023 on developing best practices to ensure that all caregivers know a resident's goals, preferences and priorities, and will continue to scale up its work on this. It also has a 2-year grant from the Michigan Health Endowment Fund to 1) develop leadership training for ECF leadership and help facilities succeed with a process improvement project, and 2) train state surveyors on person-centered care.
