

2022 Ohio Election Guide August 3, 2022

An unusual election year is one step closer to its conclusion after state legislative primaries were held across Ohio on August 2nd. Legal battles over the drawing of maps for state legislative districts led to the scheduling of an unusual summer primary that only included candidates for Ohio House, Ohio Senate, and Democrat and Republican state central committee members. Voter turnout for this second primary was extremely low with less than 7% of registered voters going to the polls.

This edition of the election guide will discuss the results of the state legislative primary races and look toward the General Election on November 8th.

August Primary Results

Every two years, all 99 seats of the Ohio House of Representatives are up for re-election. Representatives can run for four two-year terms before needing to leave the House due to term limits. Because of those term limits, early resignations by some House members, and the effects of redistricting, more than two dozen new legislators will be elected to the Ohio House of Representatives in November. Current Speaker of the House, Bob Cupp, is among the House members who will be departing at the end of 2022 due to term limits. The race for the next Speaker is ongoing and will be a hot topic of conversation around the Statehouse in the months ahead.

Every four years, half of the members of the Ohio Senate are up for re-election. Senators can only run for two four-year terms. This year, members representing the odd numbered districts are up for election. At a minimum, six new members will be elected to the Ohio Senate.

There were several interesting primary races contested on August 2nd including:

 In the Ohio House, the Democrat primary in Cuyahoga County's 16th House district featured two incumbent State Representatives, Monique Smith (D-Cleveland) and Bride Rose Sweeney (D-Cleveland). Both incumbents moved into the newly drawn 16th District to avoid difficult races against other incumbent legislators. In their primary contest, Rep. Sweeney prevailed 56-44 and will face Republican Michael Lamb in a district that only slightly leans Democrat.



- Another intriguing matchup in Cuyahoga County was the 21st Senate District, which includes Beachwood, Cleveland Heights, East Cleveland, Euclid, Maple Heights and Warrensville Heights. This is an open Senate seat in a district that overwhelmingly favors the Democrats. The Democrat primary included a matchup between current State Representative Kent Smith (D-Euclid) and former State Representative John Barnes Jr. It ended up not being close, with Rep. Smith almost guaranteed to move to the Ohio Senate after a 62-38 victory over Barnes.
- Two incumbent State Representatives were not so fortunate:
 - Rep. Mark Fraizer (R-Newark) was defeated 58-42 in the 68th House District by Thad Claggett who Fraizer narrowly defeated in the 2020 primary.
 - Rep. Shawn Stevens (R-Sunbury) was appointed to fill the seat of former State Rep. Rick Carfagna in March 2022. In his first election to hold the seat in the 61st House District, he was defeated by Beth Lear who had unsuccessfully applied for the appointment in March. The district is heavily Republican, so Lear is expected to join the House in January.
- Other than those two defeats, one of the stories of this primary election was the power of incumbency. Many current members of the General Assembly were opposed in primaries following a challenging two years where the state's Covid-19 policies often overshadowed the other work that was going on at the Statehouse. Despite that, the incumbents won and, in most cases, won easily.
 - In the 1st House District, Dontavius Jarrells (D-Columbus) defeated challenger Carolyn Harding. Jarrells will be unopposed in November.
 - Rep. Tom Patton (R-Strongsville) won his primary against Ryan McClain with 81% of the vote in the 17th House District. Things will likely not be quite as easy in November when he faces off against Democrat Troy Greenfield in a district that is a statistical toss-up.
 - Cleveland Democrats Rep. Terrence Upchurch and Rep. Juanita Brent both handily won their primary elections, and both will return to the Statehouse with no opposition in November.
 - Longtime Hamilton County legislator, Rep. Bill Seitz (R-Green Township), will likely serve another term in the Ohio House after defeating his primary challenger, Angela Hymer, 82-18. The 30th House District strongly favors the Republicans in November, where Seitz will face off against Democrat Alissa Mayhaus.



- In the 46th House District in Butler County, freshman Rep. Thomas Hall (R-Madison Township) defeated Matt King for the Republican nomination. Hall will face Democrat Lawrence Mulligan in a district that heavily favors Republicans.
- In the 47th House District, Rep. Sara Carruthers (R-Hamilton) defeated Cody Harper 80-20.
- In the 55th House District in Warren County, the House Health Committee Chairman, Rep. Scott Lipps (R-Franklin), prevailed against challenger Thomas Goodwin 69-31. The 55th District is one of the safest districts for Republicans anywhere in Ohio, so Rep. Lipps is expected to easily return to the Statehouse for another term.
- In the 65th District in Trumbull County, freshman State Representative Mike Loychik (R-Bazetta) faced a primary challenge from former State Representative Randy Law who represented Trumbull County for one term in the Ohio House in 2005-2006. Rep. Loychik ended up winning handily on a vote of 70-30. There is no Democrat on the ballot in the 65th District, so Loychik will be unopposed in November and will return to the Statehouse for a second term.
- Rep. Brian Lampton (R-Beavercreek) edged out his primary opponent Katherine Shutte in the 70th House District.
- In the 78th House District, Rep, Susan Manchester (R-Waynsfield) had one of the more difficult primaries of any of the victorious incumbents. Rep. Manchester was running in an almost entirely new district which includes all of Allen County, a county Rep. Manchester has never represented. Despite this challenge, she defeated her primary opponent, J.J. Sreenan, 55-45, and will be unopposed in the November election.
- In Union County's 86th House District, Rep. Tracy Richardson (R-Marysville) prevailed 79-21 and will face Democrat Barbara Luke in November.
- In the 90th House District, Rep. Brian Baldridge (R-Winchester) easily defeated his primary challenge from Calvin Robinson.
- In the 98th House District, Rep. Darrell Kick (R-Loudonville) held off a challenge from Scott Pullins 57-43.
- In the lone primary for an incumbent Ohio Senator, Sen. Nathan Manning (R-North Ridgeville) defeated Kirsten Hill 67-33 and will face Anthony Eliopoulos in what is expected to be a competitive general election.



Key General Election Races

Looking toward November, in addition to the two key statewide races that will dominate the headlines, Mike DeWine vs. Nan Whaley for Governor and J.D. Vance vs. Tim Ryan for US Senate, there are several interesting and competitive congressional and legislative races that will be closely watched.

- In Hamilton County, longtime US Congressman Steve Chabot is facing another tough election in a newly drawn district. The district is considered a toss-up and his opponent is Cincinnati City Councilman Greg Landsman.
- Another competitive Congressional race will be in the evenly divided 9th
 District, where another long serving member of the Ohio congressional
 delegation, Toledo's Marcy Kaptur, will face political newcomer J.R. Majewski
 in a completely different district than that one Congresswoman Kaptur currently
 represents.
- One other congressional race that will be closely watched will be the 13th District in Summit County. This is an open seat in a newly drawn district that only slightly favors the Democrats. Former Ohio House Minority Leader Emilia Sykes (D-Akron) is facing Madison Gesiotto Gilbert who used an endorsement from Donald Trump to win a crowded Republican primary in May.
- In the Ohio Senate, current State Senator Tina Maharath (D-Columbus) will face a challenge in the general election from Republican Michelle Reynolds. The 3rd Senate District only slightly leans in favor of the Democrats.
- After surviving his primary election challenge, Sen. Nathan Manning (R-North Ridgeville) has more work to do. He will be facing Democrat Anthony Eliopoulos in the general election in an extremely competitive district.
- Another close Senate race could be in the 27th District in Summit County. Senator Kristina Roegner (R-Hudson) is running in a newly drawn district that is considered a toss-up. She will be facing Democrat Patricia Goetz.
- There are numerous close races in the Ohio House after the district maps were completely redrawn for this election cycle. Incumbent House members including Mary Lightbody (D-Westerville), Richard Brown (D-Canal Winchester), Tom Patton (R-Strongsville), Bride Rose Sweeney (D-Cleveland), Daniel Troy (D-Willowick), Jessica Miranda (D-Forest Park), Bill Roemer (R-Richfield), Bob Young (R-Green), Casey Weinstein (D-Hudson), Andrea White (R-Kettering), Phil Plummer (R-Dayton), Derek Merrin (R-Monclova Township), Thomas West (D-Canton), Gayle Manning (R-North Ridgeville), Al Cutrona (R-Canfield), and Gail Pavliga (R-Atwater), are all facing competitive elections in toss-up districts.
