STRATEGY #1: OHIO'S INFRASTRUCTURE | PAST AND PRESENT

STEP 1 - INTRODUCE

Introduce: infrastructure, use both historical and contemporary examples.

STEP 2 - DISCUSS

Discuss the concepts of federal, state and local roads and highways.

STEP 3 - VISIT

Have students visit the Ohio History Central website and read the excerpt regarding the Ohio and Erie Canal:

http://ohiohistorycentral.org/w/Ohio_and_Erie_Canal.

STEP 4 - EXPLORE

Have students explore Ohio's Online Checkbook: OhioCheckbook.gov.

- Individually or in groups, have students work through the Scavenger Hunt worksheet (included).
- On the <u>OhioCheckbook.gov</u> homepage, use the "Popular Searches" button (right-hand side) to have students examine Ohio's spending for "Roads & Highways."

STEP 5 - WRITE

In small groups (or independently) have students write one paragraph comparing Ohio's spending on canals (circa 1830) and spending on roads (present day).

Questions to consider:

- Did the benefits justify the cost of the Ohio Canals?
- Should Ohio spend more or less on infrastructure today? Ask students to report the cost vs. benefit using specific data from <u>OhioCheckbook.gov</u>.

STEP 6 - RESEARCH

Buckeye Lake Dam Rehabilitation Study

- Have students research the history of Buckeye Lake.
- Have students refer to <u>OhioCheckbook.gov</u> for "Buckeye Lake Dam Rehabilitation Fund" expenditures.
- Have students research the issues and future of Buckeye Lake.
- What are the costs and benefits to the State of Ohio?

STRATEGY #2: USING GRAPHS FOR BUDGETING & COMMUNICATION

STEP 1 - INTRODUCE

Introduce the concept of financial reporting.

STEP 2 - EXPLORE & DISCUSS

Have students explore Ohio's Online Checkbook: **OhioCheckbook.gov.**

- Individually or in groups, have students work through the Scavenger Hunt worksheet (included).
- On the <u>OhioCheckbook.gov</u> homepage, review the "2015 State Spending" and "Year to Year State Spending" graphs.
- Have students manipulate both graphs using the "Redraw" function below each graph from circle (pie) graph to bar graph to stacked bar graph.
- Have students draw their own line graph using both data sets.

Questions for discussion:

- Which graph makes the data most user friendly (circle graph, line graph, bar graph and stacked bar graph)?
- Does one graph more effectively communicate the data versus another of the same data?

STEP 3 - INTRODUCE

Introduce the concept of trends.

STEP 4 - COMPARE

Have students compare expenditures for Office Depot and Staples from 2008 to 2015.

Questions for discussion:

- What trends can be identified using the data produced by the search?
- What conclusions can be made based upon these trends?
- What external factors could affect this trend?

STEP 5 - IDENTIFY

Have students identify a trend on OhioCheckbook.gov.

- Have students reproduce graphs from <u>OhioCheckbook.gov</u> that demonstrate this trend and present them to the class.
- Which graphs help to better demonstrate these trends? Discuss.

STEP 6 - INTRODUCE

Introduce the concept of using business analytics when creating a budget.

STEP 7 - ANALYZE & DISCUSS



STRATEGY #3: THE BUDGET GAME

STEP 1 - INTRODUCE

Introduce: developing a personal budget.

STEP 2 - REVIEW & DISCUSS

Have students review the budgeting tips and average household expenditures on page four of the *Budget Game* (handout included).

- Play the Budget Game or have students create a budget using the guidelines from the game.
- Utilize the *Budget Game* discussion questions to engage students.
- Discuss their personal breakdown of expenditures.
- Compare how they spent their "squares" to the average household expenditures (%).

STEP 3 - INTRODUCE

Introduce: taxes (government revenue) and government spending.

STEP 4 - EXPLORE

Have students explore Ohio's Online Checkbook: **OhioCheckbook.gov.**

- Individually or in groups, have students work through the Scavenger Hunt worksheet (included).
- On the <u>OhioCheckbook.gov</u> homepage, use the "Popular Searches" button (right-hand side) to have students examine various expense categories.

STEP 5 - WRITE

Have students write a few paragraphs comparing the average household expenditures (%) with the State of Ohio's actual expenditures from 2015 (%).

Questions to consider

- What are three similarities and three differences between the two circle graphs?
- What is the largest expense for both budgets?
- What is the smallest expense for both budgets?
- Which expense category had a surprisingly larger percentage of the total budget? Or a surprisingly smaller percentage of the total budget? Why are either of these expense types surprising?

STEP 6 - PRESENT

Have the students prepare three recommendations for personal budgeting and/or state budgeting using specific data from the *Budget Game* and Ohio's Online Checkbook. Students may work in small groups to prepare a report to present to the class.

STRATEGY #4: STUDENTS AS CITIZEN AUDITORS

STEP 1 - EXPLORE

Have students explore Ohio's Online Checkbook: OhioCheckbook.gov.

 Individually or in groups, have students work through the Scavenger Hunt worksheet (included).

STEP 2 - DEFINE & DISCUSS

Review <u>OhioCheckbook.gov</u> homepage, including the "2015 State Spending" and "Year to Year State Spending" graphs.

 Have students research and define each expense category using data from <u>OhioCheckbook.gov</u>.

Questions for discussion:

- Which is the largest expense category?
- Which is the smallest expense category?
- Which expense category had a surprisingly larger percentage of the total budget? Or a surprisingly smaller percentage of the total budget? Why are either of these expense types surprising?

STEP 3 - IDENTIFY & DISCUSS

On the OhioCheckbook.gov homepage, use the "Popular Searches" button (right-hand side) to have students examine various expense categories or use the navigation tools learned from the worksheet to generally search for individual expenses.

Have students Identify an interesting expense.

Questions for discussion:

- What do you think this expense is for?
- How did you search for it?
- What would you do if you wanted more information on this expense?

STEP 4 - INTRODUCE

Introduce: public records requests.

- Have students submit a public records request by emailing the contact listed under "Who to Contact" on the check image of the expense researched on OhioCheckbook.gov.
- Who received responses? What are the responses received? How fast were responses received?

STEP 5 - DEVELOP & ADVOCATE

Individually or in groups, have students develop a policy position on Ohio government spending using the data found from OhioCheckbook.gov.

- Ask the students to support the position using specific expenditures from <u>OhioCheckbook.gov</u>.
- Discuss the students' policy positions as a class, select one policy position and help the students transition from research to advocacy.

STRATEGY #4: STUDENTS AS CITIZEN AUDITORS EXAMPLE EVALUATION

How are recall and referendum examples of government reforms?

Answer: A recall is to remove a public official before the end of their term. A referendum is to approve or repeal an act of the legislature.

How could Ohio's Online Checkbook serve as a way to reform state government?

Answer: Providing the public access to financial ledgers and data.

What is the difference between a capital budget and an operating budget?

Answer: A capital budget is for construction, repair or reconstruction of capital asset (e.g. construction of a school building). An operating budget is an appropriation for an agency or entity's budget (e.g. Payroll).
