The Ohio Osteopathic Political Action Committee (OOPAC) serves as the political arm for the Ohio Osteopathic Association and supports candidates committed to protecting patient care by ensuring physicians serve as the leader in a team approach to medicine. Osteopathic physicians attend four years of medical school and train for 3-7 years (depending on their specialty) as a resident before becoming a practicing physician. Doctors of osteopathic medicine (DOs) are also required to participate in at least 100 hours of continuing medical education every two years to maintain licensure. We support candidates who promote patient safety and quality care by guaranteeing health care providers treat within their scope of practice.

1. Ohioans receive the best health care when physicians serve as leader in a team approach to medicine. Physicians are trained and licensed to provide comprehensive patient assessment and diagnosis and may order x-rays, chest scans, perform surgeries, and have full prescriptive authority. Physician extenders such as physician assistants, advanced practice registered nurses, physical therapists, and other providers have less education and training than physicians. However, organizations and lobbyists supporting physician extenders often pursue legislation granting access to patients that reach beyond their education and training, endangering patient care. Recently, HB 726 was introduced that would remove the collaboration agreement between APRNs (advanced practice registered nurses) and physicians. This bill comes in the wake of recent legislation that already addressed the issue. In 2016, after 18 months of working with elected officials and the nurses, the bill that was ultimately passed made amenable modifications to the APRN scope of practice, but did not include independent practice authority. Unfortunately, HB 726 jeopardizes optimum care by circumventing the physician-led, team-based approach. **Would you support or oppose HB 726?**
