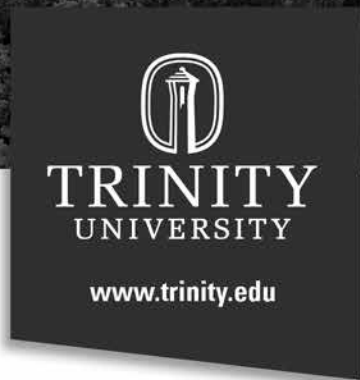
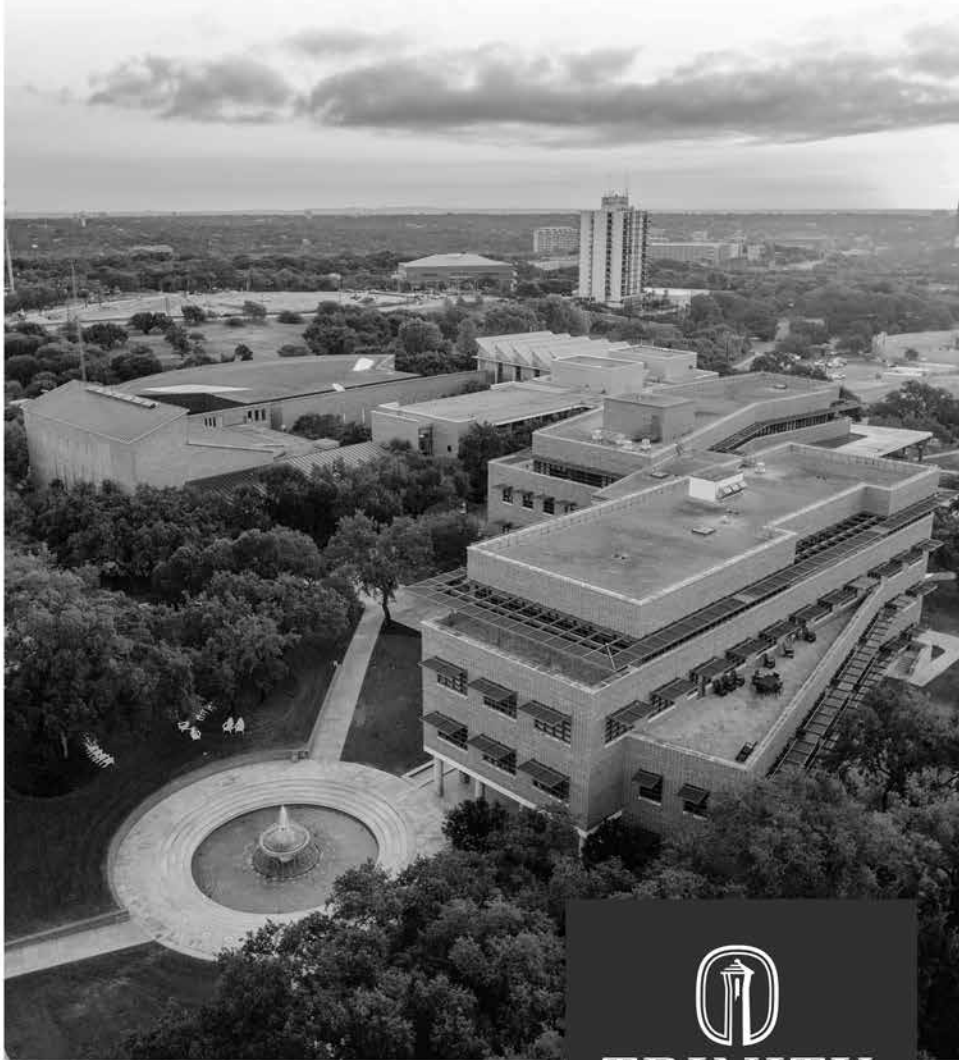

Howdy!

On behalf of the Board of the Rhetoric Society of America, I welcome you to the 2014 RSA conference. We anticipate one of the largest gathering of rhetorical scholars in our association's history and look forward to vibrant discussions and stimulating presentations.

As a minor coincidence, I was born in San Antonio and grew up in various cities in Texas. Perhaps this background, and my years of mandatory classes in Texas history, made me think about borders when I learned I would be organizing the 2014 conference. The area now constituting the state of Texas has had its borders drawn and redrawn numerous times: as the home to Apache and Coahuiltecans peoples; as part of the Republic of Mexico; as an independent nation; as a member of the Confederacy; and, as a part of the United States. These borders, of course, were never simple and their drawing and redrawing often traumatic. But even today, Texas and the city of San Antonio bears the marks of these many borders and the people who formed, contested, and crossed them.

Of course, borders are not only geographic. 2014 is the centennial of another kind of border drawing – the border that developed between composition and communication when teachers of public speaking determined to form their own association. Indeed, RSA was formed in large part as a bridge across this border and that is still one of the driving forces of the association. To mark this centennial, we have organized a special group of panels occurring Saturday at 5:15pm designed to bring prominent scholars from composition and from communication into public conversation.

A glance through this program will reveal numerous kinds of borders being examined: borders around disciplines, borders around concepts, borders around identities, etc. I hope you will enjoy these and other border rhetorics and spend some time crossing the kinds of conceptual and disciplinary borders within which we all operate. I think the opportunity to cross borders and engage with others whose conception of rhetoric may differ from one's own is this conference's greatest strength. It is also the reason we find such growth in the membership of our association.

Finally, I do want to acknowledge the many people who helped make this conference happen. The 114 people who reviewed submissions, the handful of SU colleagues who helped me organize the panels, the excellent graduate students who helped develop themes and areas. I also want to acknowledge some individuals: the amazingly resourceful Andrew Hansen, our local site coordinator; my dedicated conference assistants, Matthew Houdek and Chelsea Morris, our gracious past-president, Krista Ratcliffe, our energetic Director of Development for the conference, Roxanne Mountford, our wise Executive Director, Fred Antczak, and the ever patient Kathie Cesa, who keeps the trains running roughly on time. Whatever succeeds over the next few days is undoubtedly attributable to these kind people.

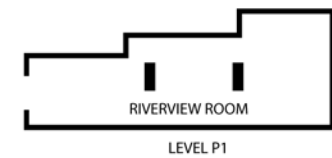
