Called to Cultivate.

In the Southern Ohio Synod we aim to cultivate Faith Communities for a changing culture, primarily for people who are not yet members of any church, either because they have never had any contact with a church or because they left the church long ago. We are convinced that such communities are most effective at reaching and including these new people when they are birthed through intentional practices of listening, service, mission to the communities where they are planted, and making disciples.

Our Vision.

We believe that the best worshiping communities are not powered by programs or models, but rather draw their strength from a strong community spirit drawn from shared contextual experience and common values among members as they align themselves with—and are aligned by—the Holy Spirit.

Why Now?

Only 48% of Americans describe themselves as a "member" of a church. 21% of Americans say they do not identify with any religion. 31% of millennials and 33% of Generation Z say they don't affiliate with any religion. (1) 23% of Americans that don't attend church say it's because "They haven't found a faith community they like."

Of those who describe themselves as members, but don't attend a church regularly 37% say it's because they choose to practice their faith in "other ways". Of those who don't attend church regularly 7 in 10 still identify with a particular tradition, including 6 in 10 who say they are Christian. 54% of people that don't attend church regularly say it's because they don't feel welcome. (2)

42% of those attending new faith communities have never attended church before or hadn't in many years. (3)

He is the author of Front Porchin', a guide to faith-sharing in the Appalachian Context; Building Missional Tables, a guide to creating congregational mission strategies; and two books: Holy Talk: An Introduction to Scripture for the Occasionally Biblically Embarrassed (2018 Lulu Press), and Rockin' the Front Porch, (2020 Lulu Press), a guide to faith sharing in today's new normal.

July 10 Creation Care and Community

Participating in God's creative and sustaining work

Your congregation can experience firsthand the awesome power of God's ongoing creative force while healing the earth and engaging the community. Sound exciting? It is!

During this interactive workshop we will discuss one congregation's awakening to earthkeeping through monarch butterfly conservation and the how the Spirit spiraled on from there. We will learn how these actions engaged the surrounding community and why congregations should fearlessly embrace the numerous scriptural references to creation care.

The presenters are all members of Christ the King Lutheran Church in West Chester, Ohio. Donna Pellegrin is the founder of Youth for Monarchs and a certificated Permaculture Designer. Laura Zajac is the Ministry Coordinator at Christ the King, and the director of Monarch Fest. Susan Fox is the Elder of Outreach as well as gardener for the church and a registered landscape architect.

August 14th Plant a Community Garden

Hands-on Creation Cultivation as Evangelism

- Does your meeting place have outside space?
- Does the lawn at your meeting place mow down resources just to look handsome?
- Does the lawn at your meeting place have a "Keep Off" sign?

If you answered yes to any of the above, this workshop is for you! We will explore the who, what, where, why and when of community gardening. But mostly we will connect with the who and why.

Explore how your handsome lawn can be leveraged into an outreach and evangelism pathway that will connect you to your neighbors, community, the hungry and more. Plant seeds so that your community will see your congregation as a growing, fruitful, welcoming and sharing neighbor.

We will not get our hands too dirty at this workshop, but be prepared to dig into your congregation, your neighborhood and your community. Basic tools will be provided to begin cultivating your garden. And there will be guidance for pathways to make more local connections and acquire more tools and resources.

The Rev. Michael D. Oakley *(he/him)* has been a pastor in the ELCA since ordination, in 1979, at Faith Lutheran, Finneytown (Cincinnati) OH. He has served ELCA Congregations in southern Wisconsin and northeast Ohio. In late 2017, Oakley retired from full time pastoring, gardening and pruning at Redeemer ELCA, Brook Park OH (RLCBP). RLCBP's gardens grew from a weed in 2008 to a center piece of the congregation's evangelism and outreach strategy. Oakley is a catalyst for groups and individuals; he has expertise in identifying issues and patterns, designing options, assembling resources, and building consensus for transformation. He is a member of First ELCA, Cincinnati. Oakley recently became a Reconciling Works Ambassador. Since last fall, he has been cultivating alongside Christ the King ELCA, West Chester OH, as they grow their garden in new directions.

The fee is reduced to \$2,000 per year with a 2 year commitment because of the synod partnership. Congregations are also asked to contribute back to the synod 10% of the increased revenue generated to cover the costs associated with this program.

ADDITIONAL STEWARDSHIP HELP

Across the country GSB works with congregations through Stewardship for All Seasons (SAS), a comprehensive stewardship program designed to fully create a culture of generosity. Congregations in their first year of SAS normally increase revenue by 10-15% and often much more than that. A far more personalized program with congregations who commit for a full year or more, SAS provides a deep dive into growing generosity in the church. If you are interested in this program, new cohorts are being launched.

Here is what one stewardship leader had to say about participation in 2020:

"We can't thank you enough for the guidance and direction on supporting our 2021 Stewardship Drive. Our results well-exceeded our expectations and is a testament to the fantastic program you offered to us. To date, pledges are 44% higher than last year totaling an increase in estimated giving of close to \$61,000! As a way to give back, we are asking the synod to keep the \$450 investment, and as well, we have increased our estimated percentage for benevolence by a full percentage point."

This comes from stewardship leader Angie Haston at Advent Lutheran Church, Murfreesboro, Tennessee. This happened not just during the pandemic, but also with an interim pastor.

Congregational Vitality Survey

What is congregational "vitality"?

Vital congregations are full of life! God's presence is tangible in their gatherings, and they bear witness to God's transforming power, helping one another to connect to the source of that power and experience that transformation in their own lives, and serving as a conduit of that power into their communities.



What is the Congregational Vitality Survey?

The Congregational Vitality Survey is a short 15-question survey that allows participants the opportunity to express how they think their congregation in doing in serving members, visitors and their community through worship, faith formation, outreach, etc. The Survey is most helpful when everyone—members, active participants, and even visitors—participates.

What happens after the Survey is completed?

Completed surveys are submitted to the Southern Ohio Synod's Director for Evangelical Mission, Pastor Katie Kerrigan, who will compile the results into a report for the congregation. She will then present the report, along with a short workshop on congregational health and vitality, to your congregational council and/or your congregation.



The results of the Congregational Vitality Survey are solely for the use of your congregation and its leadership in assessing your congregation's vitality and identifying congregational strengths, as well as those areas that are not currently promoting vitality.



How will the Congregational Vitality Survey benefit our congregation?

The Congregational Vitality Survey allows participants in the community's life to be heard and provides your congregational leadership valuable feedback on how your congregation is doing in key areas that have been proven indicators of overall health. This is particularly useful during times of congregational transition, such as a change in ministerial leadership, or at those times when your congregation seeks guidance on how and where best to invest resources and energy to move forward into the mission and ministry God has in mind for your community.

What does it cost?

While there is a more in-depth version of the Congregational Vitality Study available to congregations at a modest cost (\$100-\$500, depending on the number of surveys administered), the short version described here is a free resource made available to you by the Southern Ohio Synod.

The Collaborative is an initiative by the **Southern Ohio Synod** to walk with your congregation to hear God's mission for your community, and help you determine how you will respond to that call. Our mission is to equip leaders and their communities of faith to idenitify God's call for their congregation, build relationships, deepen faith, grow community, and respond to God's call.

Stronger and Better together.

In this effort you are not alone. Joined by congregations from across the Synod we will journey together to discover what God has in store for your community and how your church can play a part.

Change is hard. But together we face that challenge. **The Journey.** Participating congregations will be placed in groups (Cohorts). Together these Cohorts will lead their congregations, through a 24-month journey of discovery, assessment and action, including four two-day training sessions facilitated by the Congregational Vitality Team, and accompanied by a congregational mentor as they work through a variety of developmental activities designed around God's plan for your community.

Cost: \$100 Per Training Session (Covers the cost of 4-5 person team for each training. Meals provided. Lodging is not included. Scholarships are available.)
